MUSINGS FROM PASTOR DAN

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FINANCIAL 9 REPORT

Musings from Pastor Dan:

2020 is one of the strangest years of our lifetime. The pressures and strains of our lives since March are virtually incomprehensible. Fears of the Wuhan virus, lockdowns, loss of jobs, shortages of material needs, a hotly contested election, and the unknown long-term implications of all these issues that have yet to be realized only add to the anxiety many folks are experiencing. And here we are; entering the Christmas season with an increasing movement toward a new set of constraints inhibiting our lives and relationships yet again.

Despite all of those things, I propose that we focus more upon the blessedness of peace and tranquility that can only come from God. God is stronger than any difficulty we face, and He will help us through it all. Very specifically: God loves you! Jesus died for you. He has risen and wants to give you a life of freedom. Hold on to those facts. When you feel overwhelmed, first pray and seek the Lord.

Recall what the Apostle Paul wrote to the Philippian church (4:6 -7): "Do not be anx-



ious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Now, this is not a passage that suggests you should pretend the problems and the subsequent anxiety are not there. Nor does it suggest ignoring the anxiety. Rather it encourages action.

Let's take a few moments and go back in time, a few thousand years back, to the time of Simeon. The Apostle Luke tells us that Simeon was a devout and righteous man, who had the Holy Spirit with him. He was eagerly awaiting the consolation of Israel—that is the Messianic Savior of Israel. He yearned for the coming savior, but did not know when He would come. However, there was one thing he did know. The Holy Spirit revealed to Simeon that he would not die until he saw the Savior. Can you imagine what must have gone through Simeon's mind? Both great anticipation and great peace at the same time because he knew he would not die before the savior arrived.

One day, the Holy Spirit told Simeon to go to the Temple Courts. Now, the Bible doesn't tell us if he knew why he was going to the Temple Courts, nor does it tell us if Simeon even suspected why the Holy Spirit told him to go to the Temple Courts. But, we do know that Simeon obeyed.

This is Christmas according to Simeon.

While Simeon obeyed God's instructions; Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus were also on their way to the Temple Courts to fulfill the requirements of the law after circumcision. Luke 2:21-23 states, "Eight days later, when the baby was circumcised, he was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel even before he was conceived. Then it was time for the purification offering, as required by the Law of Moses after the birth of a child; so, his parents took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. The law of the Lord says, "If a woman's first child is a boy, he must be dedicated to the Lord." This is important. Exodus 13:2 says, "Dedicate to

me all the firstborn sons of Israel and every firstborn male animal. They are mine." This dedication meant that the firstborn sons of Israel were to serve God all of their lives. While the Levites actually served in the place of all first-born Israelite males, we can readily see why Jesus had to be presented at the Temple. He would indeed, serve God through his life on earth.

The stage is set. Simeon is at the Temple Courts. Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus are on their way to the Temple Courts.

As you read this story, you can sense the great anticipa-



tion of what would happen next. Sure enough, as Mary, Joseph and Jesus arrived; Simeon came over and took Jesus into his arms and praised God!! What elation!! What excitement!! What joy must have befallen Simeon as the

long-awaited Savior had finally arrived. You can almost see tears of joy...you can almost hear the excitement in his voice...you can hear Simeon Praising God with all of his heart and soul in joyous celebration of God's greatest gift to humanity as he said: "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

What a Christmas! Can you imagine yourself as Simeon? Can you imagine how you would feel and react if you were in Simeon's shoes? Look at what Simeon has just declared. He declared that God has fulfilled a promise—the promise of a Savior. Simeon declared that salvation has arrived... Indeed that Jesus is the Messiah. Simeon declared that this Messiah would be the Savior for Jew and Gentile alike. Within two weeks after His birth, Jesus' status as Savior of the entire world was recognized!

Please do not lose the excitement of the season because of worldly issues. Our place with God is eternal and secure. Nothing, and I mean nothing, can take that away from us and ultimately that is where our peace and tran-



quility reside. Recall again that which Paul wrote in Romans 8:38-39: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Peter told us to "cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). God loves you and will help you. He knows your heart and will bring clarity to your confusion.

Live it! Share it! Speak it! Jesus Christ IS Lord and Savior of all! Regardless of anything that may be wrong in our world or in your life, the only real joy, the only real peace, the only real salvation, is freely given from God through Jesus Christ! Merry Christmas!

236th Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference November 2020



Like none other, this Annual Conference, postponed from June 2020, was conducted virtually over the span of 8 sessions between September 30th and November 14th. A special vote was required In order to even hold Annual Conference virtually, vote electronically, and go without the ability to debate or amend resolutions. The earlier sessions were for "e-ballot" training, information on resolutions, and to provide a time for delegates to ask questions and seek clarification.

Resolutions snapshot:

Financial- all passed

Redistricting: Our conference is currently divided into 4 districts with St. Luke's part of the Easton District. Beginning on July 1, 2021, our conference will consist of 3 districts with St. Luke's in the Central area. Exact boundary determinations are up to the Bishop with input from congregations, pastors, and the Cabinet, but will most likely be Northern, Central, and Southern. All District offices will then be relocated to Dover, DE. It is estimated that these changes will save the conference \$300,000 per year.

<u>Disaffiliation</u>: Congregations from four churches within our conference sought to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. They each followed the established procedures to this point and were approved by the voting members of Annual Conference. Disaffiliation will be finalized once each completes the final required steps.

Celebrating the lives of those in ministry:

Bishop Johnson's message, "Seeing Jesus", not only referred to the faithful service given by those celebrated, but to each and every one of us, as we are to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our communities and beyond.

Guest speaker, Bishop Sharma Lewis' message "Take Jesus to the Streets" stressed the need for finding creative ways to continue sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ, especially during this Covid Pandemic and beyond.

Retirees- including Rev. Earle Baker (a Denton native) and Rev. Dr. Vanessa Lee

Service of Remembrance- celebrated the lives of clergy or spouse who passed away prior to June 2020.

Service of Commissioning and Ordination-Ronald Bell, Jr. ordained as an Elder in Full Connection.

A very moving part of this service was the "Passing of the Mantle". Rev. Baker explained that in 2 Kings 2:9, Elisha prayed that the power of the Holy Spirit at work in the prophet Elijah would be passed to him when Elijah was taken up to Heaven. The Mantle (cloak), the symbol of that power, was passed from Elijah to the younger prophet Elisha. In that same spirit, our conference retirees took a "mantle" from their shoulders and placed them on the shoulders of those newly ordained. What a spirit-filled moment!

St. Luke's contributed \$50 to each of the 3 Conference Appeals: Board of Ordained Ministries Scholarships (for those preparing for the ministry), the Central Congo Partnership (clean water, education, health care, self-sustaining agricultural program), and Salisbury Urban Ministries (provides programs that serve and minister to the needs of materially impoverished people).

Please continue to keep St. Luke's and the United Methodist Church in your prayers as we try to live into the lives God has planned for us!



Trustees Report

The Board of Trustees is entrusted to manage the property, equipment and investments of the church.

This past year we have replaced the roof on the sanctuary at a cost of \$38,281.00, repaired the ceiling tiles in the sanctuary at a cost of \$3165.00, replaced exit and emergency lights and ongoing maintenance, painting and service on equipment.

In addition, the past few years we have financed the renovation of rooms 1 and 3, purchased new chairs for the fellowship hall, replaced the heat and air systems in the sanctuary and fellowship hall, repaired and painted all exterior trim on the entire church property, upgraded the sound systems and lighting in the sanctuary and fellowship hall, and replaced several heat and air units in the education wing.

We have several expense items being considered for the future, i.e. installing additional heat and air units in the upstairs Sunday school room, installing a new bathroom on the second floor of the education wing for the Sunday school, and re-surfacing the parking lot.

The trustees financial accounts are comprised of bequests received from members and friends of St. Luke's over the years. In the recent years we have received bequests from the estates of Jo Ann Collins, Madge Thomas and J. Boone Jarrell. The church's trustee funds include unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted funds. The bulk of these funds are invested and we receive dividends monthly.

We would like to thank several volunteers who have helped to keep our property in shape this year; Mark Beaven and his crew for yardwork, Mike Penn for power washing, and Mary Robbins who will be cleaning gravestones in the old St. Luke's cemetery across from the church. We are in need of a group to volunteer to weed and trim the landscaping on a regular basis; if interested contact a trustee.

The trustees, after much discussion, have agreed that we should sell the parsonage. Our new pastor will not be residing there, he has a home in Williston and our prior pastor used it sparingly. It is an older structure which requires continual upkeep and we will sell it "as is". We are in the process of getting an appraisal, survey and preparing a Resolution to Sell. The congregation will have an opportunity to express concerns at a Charge Conference prior to it being listed for sale. Monies received from the sale will be invested in a safe interest-bearing account to be used solely for the purpose of acquiring another house should a subsequent pastor require housing.
