History is an unpleasant subject for many people. The study of the past seems to contradict our drive to look ahead. Overall, Americans are woefully ignorant about history, even recent history. A study completed some years ago showed a significant number of college students believed the words in the "Declaration of Independence" to be part of a communist document. Time and time again, various 'man on the street" interviews and studies Illustrate a remarkable ignorance of histoty.

In a few of our recent Bile Study classes I noted how too many Christians suffer from the same lack of historical knowledge—particularly as it pertains to he Old Testament. Comments such as, 'We don't have to study the Old Testanent now because Christ changed all of hat," and "We don't need to know that stuff because we are living under grace" are common. You can even purchase Bibles that contain only the New Testament (with Psalms and Proverbs).


The general disregard for the Old Testament is unfortunate. Forfeited are countless blessings and a complete understanding of the New Testament. Jesus warned that he did not come to abolish the law and the prophets but to fulfill them. He further said, "I tell you the truth, until heaven and earth disappear, not the smallest letter, not the least stroke of a pen, will by any means disappear from the Law until everything is accomplished" (Matthew 5:18). Jesus admonished us not to fall into the trap of ignoring the Old Testament. Keep in mind that the Old Testament *was*

> For example, we cannot even begin to grasp the nature of God unless we study how He interacted with His people throughout history. God's revelation of his character is important to understanding how we are to order our lives.

> Immediately after Adam and Eve commit the first sin, God revealed his character by announcing his salvation plan in Genesis 3:15.

> > "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel." Genesis 3:15



God's sovereignty and the love for His people were displayed to the Israelites, Moses, and Pharaoh through the ten plagues bestowed upon Egypt (Exodus 7:14-12:30). The Exodus proves God's willingness to interact with us. The Law given to Moses provides moral instruction.



God made covenants with Noah, promising not to destroy mankind through a flood again (Gen. 9:1-17); with Abraham, promising land, the seed of Christ and blessings (Gen. 15); with Moses, choosing the nation of Israel to be His people (Ex. 19:5-6); with David, promising to make the Davidic dynasty the throne of Israel.

These covenants, among others, demonstrate God's willingness to commit himself unconditionally to bless us. God accepts our faith, though it is often smaller than a mustard seed, and gives to us a righteousness we could never attain. All these examples demonstrate the magnificent character of God.


Though the greatest demonstration of God's character is in Christ Jesus, unless we thoroughly understand the Old Testament, Christ's work on

the cross is tantamount to reading only the climax of a book. If you read only the climax, it becomes an undefined and misunderstood event. You cannot know what lead to the climax, or what happens after. To be sure, not studying the Old Testament will limit your understanding of God as he revealed himself to us and you will miss the overall impact of what God has done for us. Perhaps this is why so many Christians do not understand "how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge . . ." (Eph. 3:18-19).







Summary of Meeting Minutes March 20th, 2025

Team Reports

Property and Investment Management/Trustees (Barbara Little, Chair)

- Water retention project cost estimate is \$28K and the Trustees will work with the contractor to bring that cost down
- Getting quotes for the cost of installing two large 8' ceiling fans in the fellowship hall.
- Cost estimate for installing TV's in the sanctuary is approximately \$5K.
- Hardware on the front doors will need replacing in future but will wait until it no longer works.
- Will Manship of East Bay Landscapes will do spring cleanup again this year (did a good job last two years.)
- Need an appraisal of the value of the church property & are looking for a for an appraisal company.
- Trustees have reviewed the current Building Use Agreement for church rentals and will also evaluate the fee structure for rentals.
- The ceiling in the library has two missing tiles and is difficult to fix. The Trustees are monitoring it to determine if it continues to leak before fixing it. If the roof needs replacing, the cost is approximately \$50K.

Mission and Ministry Committee (No Chair, No meeting)

Finance Committee (Bob Willey, Treasurer)

- Bob went over the Treasurer's and Financial Reports (see attached reports)
- He is a bit concerned about the overall giving, which is lagging behind projections. However, March has five Sundays, and Pastor Dan reported that Easter giving is often higher.
- A representative from the GMC Finance Team contacted Bob to offer assistance as needed with Church Finances.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (Laura Patrick, Chair)

- CPR class is being rescheduled (due to illness of the instructor). Let Laura know if you would like to get certified.
- We had one lead for a pianist/organist, but it did not work out. We continue to advertise for the Organist and Sexton positions in local news and through church communications.
- SPRC continues to keep up-to-date with and document staff evaluations and issues.

New Business:

From Pastor Dan:

- Lenten Soup Suppers are once again well attended. There will be no soup supper April 4th when he and Missy are out of town.
- GMC is still settling into its new denominational structures and making appointments to conference committees. Pastor Dan is very happy with the focus of the GMC to date.

From Jody Herb:

- Sheriff Baker spoke with her about community needs and reported that many of the calls they receive involve child abuse cases. Jody plans to meet with a child liaison to see if the church can make comfort packets for kids.
- Linda Parsons and Paula Penn serve dinner to His Hope Haven periodically and if anyone is interested in helping them, or delivering a meal, they would be most welcome. <u>Link to Meal Train Signup.</u>
